MEMBER NEWS

This month we were pleased to welcome new members including Transurban, Telstra and Transport Canberra. These organisations are all leaders in the provision of infrastructure and technology to support the testing and deployment of emerging transport technologies, such as Australia's first live-traffic [automated truck trial](#) conducted by Transurban on CityLink in Melbourne, and Telstra's world-first commercial network deployment of Ericsson's packet fronthaul technology, which paves the way for future Cloud Radio Access Network connections for technologies like AI, IoT and 5G in Australia.

CCAT member the Australian Road Research Board (ARRB) is extending its expertise towards multimodal transport, launching the National Transport Research Organisation (NTRO) for Australia and New Zealand on 1 December 2022. NTRO will have three major disciplines – ARRB for roads, the Australasian Centre for Rail Innovation for rail, and Ports and Airports. A launch event was hosted at NTRO's head office in Melbourne and attended by leaders and advocates from around the transport industry, including speakers Paul Younis, Transport Secretary, Victorian Department of Transport and Matt Pinnegar, Chief Executive of the Australian Local Government Association (ALGA). BOARDROOM LUNCHES



CCAT held two boardroom lunches in Brisbane and Sydney in December for members and thought leaders in future transport. About 20 attendees from across government, industry, consulting and academia came together at each event to share ideas and hear from some impressive speakers.

In Brisbane, Councillor Ryan Murphy, Civic Cabinet Chair for Transport at the Brisbane City Council, outlined the council's major transport infrastructure projects including insights on the preparations for the 2032 Olympic Games. In Sydney, Richard Host, Chief Technology and Innovation Officer at Transport for NSW spoke about the government's connected and automated vehicle priorities and shared his thoughts on future transport business models.
